## Plenary Speakers

### The Art of Perception

Amy E. Herman, JD, MA



Amy E. Herman, JD, MA, designed, developed and conducts all sessions of the *The Art of Perception*. While working at The Frick Collection, she instituted the program for medical students to improve their observation skills. After expanding the medical program to seven medical schools in New York, Ms. Herman adapted the program for law enforcement professionals across a wide range of agencies including the New York City Police Department, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Department of Justice and the Secret Service. Before joining Thirteen/WNET.ORG as Director of Educational Development in 2007, Ms. Herman was the Head of Education at The Frick Collection for over ten years, where she oversaw all of the Collection's educational collaborations and community initiatives. Ms. Herman holds a BA in International Affairs from Lafayette College, a JD from the National Law Center, George Washington University, and an MA in Art History from Hunter College.

### Playing Nicely: Working Together to Protect Children

Cindy W. Christian, MD



Cindy W. Christian, M.D., holds the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia Chair in the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect. She is Co-Director of Safe Place: The Center for Child Protection and Health at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and Associate Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine. Dr. Christian devotes much of her clinical and academic work to the care of abused children and lectures nationally on related topics. She is a member of a number of local and national organizations devoted to maltreated children. In July 2010, Dr. Christian was named as Philadelphia's first Medical Director to improve the health and well-being of children in the city's welfare system.

## Plenary Speakers

### Current Issues Affecting the Multidisciplinary Response to Child Abuse

Chris Newlin, MS LPC



Chris Newlin, MS LPC, has been the Executive Director of the National Children's Advocacy Center since July 2005. He is responsible for providing leadership and management of NCAC and participating in national and international leadership activities regarding the protection of children. The NCAC was the first Child Advocacy Center in the United States, and continues to provide both prevention and intervention services for child abuse in Huntsville/Madison County, and also houses the NCAC National Training Center, the Southern Regional CAC, and the Child Abuse Library Online (CALiO). In these capacities, Chris oversees a staff of 53 professionals and a yearly budget of 5 million dollars. Chris is a Board Member of the Alabama Network of Children's Advocacy Centers, an ex-officio Board Member for the National Children's Alliance, member of the International Society for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (ISPCAN), and a Clinical Member of the Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers (ATSA). He is also the former Training Faculty Coordinator for Finding Words Georgia and a training faculty member of the National Children's Advocacy Center's Forensic Interviewing Training Program. Chris has presented at numerous local, regional, national and international conferences; and recent areas of interest are the international development of the Child Advocacy Center model, implementation of evidence-based practices within the CAC model, and the dissemination and utilization of child maltreatment research to improve frontline practice. Chris graduated from Hendrix College, the University of Central Arkansas, and the Harvard Business School Executive Education Program.

# Session I Workshops – Wednesday, Oct. 19

**1:15 to 2:30**

## **Workshop A: CPOD Response to Serious Injuries and Death Cases, Patti Toth, JD**

What first responders do, in the critical first hours after a sudden unexplained or unexpected child death or serious physical injury, often determines whether we accurately identify inflicted versus accidental injuries or natural deaths. A Washington State project recently developed statewide guidelines and training for first responders. The resulting user-friendly guidelines are called the C-POD, which stands for the key principles that should guide any first responder: Collaboration, Preservation, Observation and Documentation. This workshop will review the C-POD Guidelines and training, as well as the CDC's new SUIDI (Sudden Unexplained Infant Death Investigation) evidence collection form.

## **Workshop B: Creating a Supportive Helping Environment for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender Youth, David Kilmnick, PhD, MSW**

This interactive workshop will assist providers in becoming aware of the needs of gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender (GLBT) individuals, and offers skills on how to provide culturally appropriate and sensitive services to this population. A wide variety of issues facing GLBT individuals and GLBT-headed families will be examined and discussed.

## **Workshop C: Non-Verbal Children & Evidence Based Prosecution, Eleanor Odom, JD, MA and Detective Tony Foreman**

When children cannot verbalize physical and sexual abuse they have suffered, how is a case investigated? When the perpetrator could be one of several people, how do law enforcement officers and prosecutors seek justice for the victim? This workshop focuses on identifying perpetrators of child abuse when the victim cannot point to a specific person. We will examine various types of corroborating evidence so that cases can be successfully prosecuted.

## **Workshop D: Stewards of Children: Part I, Kellie Turner, MEd**

Stewards of Children is a sexual abuse prevention training program that educates adults to prevent, recognize and react responsibly to child sexual abuse. Provided as a three hour training, the program is presented by an authorized facilitator. An interactive workbook and accompanying video are utilized to share the message that adults are accountable for the safety of children. This training has been presented nationally and has demonstrated increased knowledge, improvements in attitudes, and changes in child-protective behaviors in participants. ## **Workshop E: Postpartum Depression and Other Related Illnesses: Assessment, Intervention and Support, Megan O'Hara, MSW, LCSW**

This workshop will cover the prevalence and incidence of perinatal mood and anxiety disorders (PMAD), why its important to intervene and support a family dealing with PMAD's, and how to promote family healing.

## **Workshop F: When a Child Takes it Back: Successfully Prosecuting a Case Where the Child Recants, Mary Ann Burkhart, JD**

The reality is that at some point in our cases of child physical or sexual abuse, the child victim will recant their allegations of abuse. This workshop will discuss those realities, point out the most common triggers or risk factors related to recantation, and provide hints and strategies for dealing with recanting victims in both the pretrial and trial settings.

## Workshop A: CPOD Response to Serious Injuries and Death Cases, Patti Toth, JD

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This interactive workshop will assist providers in becoming aware of the needs of gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender (GLBT) individuals, and offers skills on how to provide culturally appropriate and sensitive services to this population. A wide variety of issues facing GLBT individuals and GLBT-headed families will be examined and discussed.

## Workshop C: Uses and Misuses of Expert Testimony, Mary-Ann Burkhart, JD

In cases of child physical and sexual abuse, and especially in cases involving child victims of homicide, the burden of proof will often rest on the testimony of expert witnesses. This workshop will explore those situations in which expert testimony is vital, provide the information necessary in order to qualify a witness as an expert, discuss the importance of presenting the testimony in a way that is informative and interesting to a jury, and strategize regarding what an expert witness may or may not say in particular case scenarios.

## Workshop D: Stewards of Children: Part 2, Kellie Turner, MEd

*Stewards of Children* is a sexual abuse prevention training program that educates adults to prevent, recognize and react responsibly to child sexual abuse. Provided as a three hour training, the program is presented by an authorized facilitator. An interactive workbook and accompanying video are utilized to share the message that adults are accountable for the safety of children. This training has been presented nationally and has demonstrated increased knowledge, improvements in attitudes, and changes in child-protective behaviors in participants. ## Workshop E: Addressing Risk Factors in Pregnancy and Support through Home Visiting Programs, Meena Ramakrishnan, MD, MPH, Terry Dombrowski, RN, Leah Woodall, MPA and Vikki Benson, BSN, RNC

This workshop will cover the eight key issues emerging from the Fetal Infant Mortality Reviews. Participants will have the opportunity to learn what protective home visiting programs are available for pregnant women in Delaware.

## Workshop F: Strengthening Our Multi-Disciplinary Teams, Eleanor Odom, JD, MA, and Detective Tony Foreman

This presentation discusses ways to strengthen multi-disciplinary teams. We will identify effective intervention and preventive measures to decrease child physical and sexual abuse.

## Session III Workshops – Thursday, Oct. 20

**10:45 to 12:00**

### **Workshop A: Family Violence and Child Abuse: The Interconnection, Mary-Ann Burkhart, JD**

In the vast majority of cases, where there is spousal abuse there is also child abuse. As family violence professionals, we oftentimes focus on the violence before us and don't look behind or beyond. This workshop will discuss spousal abuse, explore the ways in which children are used in violent homes, and encourage professionals to look behind the spousal abuse in order to take care of the children.

### **Workshop B: Opening Doors for LGBTQ Youth in Foster Care: A Legal Guide, Garry Bevel, JD and Mimi Laver, JD**

The number of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and questioning youth who experience hostility and violence at home, school and in foster care is alarming. As high is the number of LGBTQ youth who drop out of school, runaway or become homeless. The ABA created the Opening Doors Project to better equip professionals who can help LGBTQ youth. This session will include examining roles in protecting youth, as well as attitudes and beliefs, to improve advocacy and decision making for LGBTQ youth.

### **Workshop C: Allegations of Sexual Abuse in High Conflict Divorcing Parents, Mindy Mitnick, EdM, MA**

When allegations of abuse are made, resolving custody and parenting time disputes becomes highly challenging. This workshop will review research on the founded, unfounded and false allegations of sexual abuse during custody and parenting time disputes. Participants will also learn about reliable assessments of the alleged victim, the alleged perpetrator and parents who make allegations.

### **Workshop D: The Medical Evaluation For Suspected Physical Abuse: What it Can and Cannot Tell You, Joanne Wood, MD**

A physical injury to a child oftentimes requires a medical evaluation, particularly when the injury is unexplained or suspicious. In this session, participants will gain an understanding of the physician's role in child abuse investigations, but more specifically, participants will learn the medical aspects of suspected child abuse.

### **Workshop E: Child Produced Child Pornography and Online Luring, Mary Leary, JD**

This session will discuss and analyze two different phenomenon involving the distribution of sexually explicit images of youth. While the media has generalized and glamorized various diverse behaviors under one undefined umbrella term, "sexting," prosecutors and allied professionals cannot afford to do so. This session discusses the different circumstances in which youth distribute sexually explicit images of themselves or other youth and the resultant legal implications. The session distinguishes between non-criminal activity, child-produced child pornography, and the grooming of youth through online luring, and offers guidance in developing an appropriate societal response.

### **Workshop F: What do we know about SUID and how do we know it? Lena Camperlengo, RN, DrPH**

Sudden Unexpected Infant Deaths (SUID) are those infant deaths whose cause and manner of death are not immediately obvious. The SUID Case Registry, building on the existing child death review process, collects information on these deaths and how they were investigated. Using this information, we can better categorize SUID cases based on like characteristics, which will allow us to better understand common risk factors associated with these deaths.
